# From The Chief Editor's Desk ...

I've only ever lived in the U.S., so aside from hearing others who live in other parts of the world talk, I don't have much frame of reference for how "things are" outside of my native country. And, as someone who is still considered "middle class," I don't have the opportunity to travel to the far flung, distant places that I would love to be able to travel to. As such, I apologize in advance that this month's column is going to be rather U.S.-centric.



One of my absolute favorite "personalities" is a guy that you all have most likely watched. He is Mike Rowe, and the host of Discovery channel's hit show, Dirty Jobs. If you're not familiar with him, click on the previous link to bring up some interesting non-Dirty-Jobs appearances that are on YouTube, including a talk he gave for TED.

Rowe's time on Dirty Jobs illustrated a real disconnect in the American education system, and in America as a whole, and he set out to try to do something about it.

Back in the 1950s through the 1980s, American high schools typically embraced academics **and** vocational training. Somewhere along that journey, someone thought it would be a good idea that ALL students strive to attend college for a traditional four-year degree. As a result, most high school home economics (cooking) classes, along with auto mechanics, carpentry, metalworking, and other vocational training classes were axed.

The end result is/was multifaceted, and not entirely the "good results" that were sought. College students graduating today face ENORMOUS debt directly caused by that college education. The cost of a college education has risen in the U.S. at a rate that outpaces even the costs of health care. College graduates, collectively, face \$1.5 *trillion* (U.S.) of debt. Meanwhile, there are OVER 7 *million* skilled job openings that cannot be filled, simply because there is no one with the skills to fill those jobs.

Most of these jobs are the types of things that were previously taught in high school vocational education programs ... you know, the ones that they did away with. These include diesel mechanics, auto mechanics, carpenters, plumbers, electricians, aircraft mechanics, heavy equipment operators, and other skilled labor jobs.

Meanwhile, many of the college graduates ... the ones who are now impacted by a HUGE debt for that college education ... are now either unemployed, underemployed, or working at jobs that have absolutely NOTHING to do with their college education. Sometimes, that situation is understandable. I mean, what can you expect to be able to do with a degree in medieval textiles? The same goes for a gazillion other "professions" with limited marketability or demand.

But not everyone needs to be a doctor, or a lawyer, or an engineer, or a teacher, or an accountant. MBAs are a dime-a-dozen these days. Sometimes, you need someone who can pave the roads, build the houses, wire and plumb those houses, landscape the yards, unclog the toilet, build bridges, fix our vehicles, etc. And, because of the push in American education towards EVERYONE getting a college education, we have a surplus of the former, and a serious drought of those trained to do the latter.

So, remember I said Rowe set out to do something about that disconnect? Well, in 2008, he founded the Mike Rowe WORKS Foundation to push for training for skilled labor jobs. You can read more about his foundation here. He even has a listing of skilled labor job openings on his foundation website here.

I can remember when I was headed into what we then called "junior high school." I was so excited to have a "shop class." There, I made a wooden cutout of a fish, where I learned how to use a bandsaw, a scroll saw, and a coping saw. I made a metal planter, where I learned how to cut metal, spot weld that metal, solder that metal, and paint that metal. We constructed small kit motors, so we could learn the basics of how electric motors worked. But, still to this day, those "skills" serve me well. I do as many of my own home repairs and maintenance as I'm able (but I HATE plumbing!). I maintain my own lawn mowers and yard equipment. I've built my own chicken coop and run. And, doing these tasks or projects myself is DEEPLY rewarding and satisfying.

Readers of my monthly "From The Chief Editor's Desk ..." column will have seen pictures of me with my kids on a regular basis. As a parent, I think it's fairly natural to look at your kids and imagine what path their lives might take. For Ryan, I can see him equally happy in either a skilled job or in one driven more by academics. For Lexi, I can see her finding happiness in more academic roles. They are both right at dad's side whenever I have a project around the house, and I try my hardest to pass on to my kids that passion for the skilled, manual labor tasks that I undertake.

Hey. Everyone likes to get something for free. So put your wallets and credit cards away. The internet is chock full of freebies, if you only know where to look.

#### Free Books/Ebooks



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It would be a trivial task to burn multiple books to a CD (each book's audio files appear to typically be less than 200MiB, so you should get three or four books on a 700MiB CD), with all the MP3 files for each book in their own folder, and them play them back in your car over its stereo, especially if your car's CD player plays MP3 CDs. Some newer cars even have a USB port, where the stereo will read files from a USB flash drive. Most USB flash drives have capacities far greater than the 700MiB capacity of a CD, increasing the number of audiobooks you can put on there immensely.

LibriVox is probably one of the premiere sites to download free audiobooks. They have entered a partnership with Project Gutenberg to produce free audiobooks of public domain content. As far as I can tell, all of the audiobook files are multi-part MP3 files, one MP3 file per book chapter, presented in a ZIP file archive. They currently have more than 10,000 audiobook files available, totally for free.

Loyal Books is another site that offers free audiobooks. You can download each individual chapter of a book as its own MP3 file, or you can download a zip file of all the chapters, with each chapter in its own MP3 file. You might have to look around on the download page to find the download link for the zip file, but it is there.

Open Culture mostly serves as a "link farm" that connects visitors to the site with the material they are looking for. So, while they don't have anything original themselves, they do help take some of the trouble finding files away by grouping a list of available resources all together. They claim to provide links to 1,000 audiobooks.

The Lit2Go site offers up a significant number of audiobooks available for download to your computer. Each chapter of each book must be downloaded individually as a MP3 file. So, in the case of "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," you will have to download 43 different MP3 files, one for each chapter in the book.

#### **Free Print Magazines**



No, we're not talking about ezines/emags like The PCLinuxOS Magazine, or any number of other similar magazines. We're talking about the more traditional print magazines. You know, like the ones you grew up with. Plus, it's kind of nice to get something in your snail mail mailbox besides bills, especially when it's something you're interested in. Some of the free magazine subscriptions are only for the digital version of the magazine, but contains the same content as the print version.

### Free-bruary: Free (Or Almost Free) Stuff For You

You might be surprised by the premiere print magazines you can get for free. I know that I was quite surprised by what I found on the list. But before we get to which ones you can get for free, let's talk about some things to beware of.

First of all, to get these magazines for free, you will typically have to complete a survey and give up some of your personal information. Much of what they ask for can be found easily enough, like your address, age, gender, email address, etc. As such, you might prepare yourself for at least a slight increase in email (unless you use a disposable email address). With some, the more surveys you complete, the more magazines you qualify to receive for free.

Second, if they make "special offers" to you during the course of the survey, skip them (unless you REALLY want them). Rejecting them typically does NOT affect your ability to receive the magazine(s) for free.

Third, if they ask for any credit card information, skip getting that magazine. They may be looking to charge your credit card to keep your subscription going after your free subscription expires. Just move along to another magazine that piques your interest.

So, exactly what magazines can you expect to find that you can get free subscriptions to? Below is a list that is current as of the time that I wrote this article. Keep in mind that the available magazines change from time to time, so some of these may or may not be available by the time this article is published.



The first place to look is at Today's Rewards. You will have to register for a free account, but then you earn "points" for each survey question asked. When you have enough points, you can "cash in your points" for free digital magazine subscriptions.

Here is the list of magazines on the list: Bicycling, Cosmopolitan, Elle, Esquire, Good Housekeeping, HGTV Magazine, Marie Claire, Road & Track, Town & Country, Woman's Day, Food Network Magazine, Car & Driver, House Beautiful, Men's Health, Women's Health, Prevention, O The Oprah Magazine, Country Living, Harper's Bazaar, Popular Mechanics, Redbook, Elle Decor, Runner's World, and Veranda.

Most all of the magazines "cost" 10 reward points, and are for a free one year digital subscription to your chosen magazine(s).

Reward Survey also uses a rewards points approach to allow you to choose which magazines you'd like to receive. The difference is that users are given 30 reward points to use towards redemption on the magazines just as soon as they sign up. Most magazines are available for a one year subscription for redemption of 10 reward points. Some magazines, like Cigar Aficionado and Wine Spectator, are available for a one year subscription of 20 reward points. It is unclear from reading the website and/or the offer whether the magazines you receive are actual paper copies via snail mail, or if you get access to digital copies emailed to you.

DealTrunk is another site that lists a LOT of free magazines that escape the net cast by the other two previously mentioned sites/offers. It works just like the previous two sites, where you provide your information, complete some surveys, and then are rewarded with a free subscription to your chosen magazine(s) (you can choose up to three magazines). Just as with the aforementioned "Reward Survey" site, it's unclear if you will receive an actual paper copy of the magazine via snail mail, or if you gain access via digital copies emailed to you.

Here are the magazines that are available at the DealTrunk site, as of the time that I am writing this article. Keep in mind that the free subscription offers may end at any time, and they change from time to time. Also, read through the list carefully, because they are not presented in any particular order.

Parents: complimentary two year subscription.

Esquire: complimentary one year subscription.

C California Style: complimentary one year subscription.

Town and Country: complimentary one year subscription.

DuJour: complimentary subscription, length unspecified.

Home & Lands: complimentary subscription, length unspecified.

This Old House: one free magazine issue.

Traditional Home: complimentary two year subscription.

Elle Decor: complimentary one year subscription.

Country Living: complimentary one year subscription.

Weight Watchers: complimentary one year subscription.

Men's Health: complimentary one year subscription.

Rachel Ray Everyday: complimentary two year subscription.

Food Network: complimentary two year subscription.

Prepared Foods: complimentary subscription, unspecified length.

Whiskey Advocate: complimentary one year subscription.

Beverage Industry: complimentary subscription, unspecified length.

Wired: one free complimentary issue.

CNET: complimentary one year subscription.

Rider: complimentary one year subscription.

Subaru Drive & Performance: complimentary subscription, unspecified length.

Digital Photo Pro: complimentary one year subscription.

Outdoor Photographer: complimentary one year subscription.

Lego Life: free magazine for children, covering all things Legos.

Clay Times: complimentary free issue.

People Magazine: complimentary one year subscription.

Fast Company: complimentary one year subscription.

Entrepreneur: complimentary one year subscription.

Money: complimentary two year subscription.

Time: complimentary subscription, unspecified length.

Fortune: complimentary two year subscription.

Travel + Leisure: complimentary subscription, unspecified length.

National Geographic: complimentary free issue.

There should be something in the above list that appeals to the interests of most people.

Free Movies & TV Shows



I know we've covered free movie and TV show streaming in the past. Most of the time, we've published articles on individual streaming options. But, to be honest, I don't know that we've presented free movie and TV show streaming options all together before. So, let's rectify that now.

Be forewarned that streaming a lot of movies and/or TV shows will consume a considerable chunk of data. So, if you're on a metered internet plan, have modest data caps, or if you don't have a reasonably fast internet connection, you may be rather limited on how well streaming will work out for you.



Pluto TV is, by far, one of the free streaming sites with the most to offer. To start with, it presents streaming Live TV, featuring many channels (hundreds by their count). There are dedicated Star Trek channels, an AMC channel, a MST3K channel, a SciFi channel, multiple comedy channels, multiple movie channels, a military channel, a documentary channel. children's channels (including my daughter's favorite, Dora TV, featuring non-stop, 24 hours a day streaming of Dora The Explorer), news channels, and way more than we can list here. Do you like Westerns? You will certainly find a Live

TV stream to keep you coming back for more. Do you like game shows? There's a channel for you. Pluto TV has just about anything for just about everyone. We originally covered Pluto TV in the August 2019 issue of The PCLinuxOS Magazine.

But wait! There's more! Pluto TV also features 1000s of On Demand movies. While most are not "first run" movies, there is something for everyone. If you can't find a movie you want to watch, then you're WAY too picky or way too hard to please. The movies are divided up into many, many categories (by my estimate, over 100 different categories), so you don't have to wade through all the movies to find the movie genre that you are interested in. There are kids movies, family movies, horror movies, sci fi movies, adventure movies, drama movies, comedy movies, military/war movies, western movies, concert movies, romance movies, documentary movies, and many, many more categories than I can (or will) list here.

You can watch shows on Pluto TV without signing in, or without creating an account. However, both options are available, if you choose. There is a Pluto TV app for both Android and iOS, enabling you to watch Pluto TV on your mobile devices, and streaming Pluto TV content is an option on my SmartTV in my living room. Of course, you can also watch it in your browser (Firefox or Chrome for sure, but YMMV with other browsers) on your PCLinuxOS desktop.



TubiTV is another excellent source for streaming movies and TV shows for free. Owned by Fox Corporation, TubiTV is supported by ads. So, do expect to see some ads inserted into the movies and shows you choose to watch. However, those ads are typically less intrusive (lengthwise) than what you experience with overthe-air broadcasts. We originally covered TubiTV in the May 2016 issue of The PCLinuxOS Magazine.

Just as with Pluto TV, you can view the TubiTV content without creating an account, and without logging in.

There is an advantage, however, of creating an account and logging in under that account. When you find something on TubiTV that you want to watch (but maybe you don't have time at the moment to watch it), you can add that content to your watch list, called My List.

Some of the categories that you'll find TubiTV content under are Recently Added, Black Cinema, Most Popular, Family Movies, Documentary, Horror, Action, Something Completely Different, Movie Night, Comedy, Faith, Sci Fi & Fantasy, New Releases, Romance, Westerns, Standup Comedy, Leaving Soon, Award Winners & Nominees, Thrillers, Preschool, Martial Arts, Kids Shows, Classics, Not On Netflix, Trending Now, and many, many more.

If you add content to your "My List" of things you want to watch, don't take too long to get around to watching it/them. Content comes and goes from TubiTV fairly regularly, so if you wait too long, items in your list may not be available for you to watch. Did you notice the "Recently Added" and "Leaving Soon" categories above? There's a reason for those.

Vudu is that place where you get your "free" digital copy when you buy a movie or TV shows on DVD or BluRay. If you buy movies or TV shows on optical media, you have probably seen the slips of paper inserted into the packaging with a code to input on the Vudu site to secure/procure your digital copy. We originally covered Vudu in the January 2019 issue of The PCLinuxOS Magazine.

Well, Vudu also has a lot of free content. That content is supported by ads inserted into the content stream. Like with TubiTV, the ads on Vudu are short and rather unobtrusive. Unlike TubiTV, you will need to create an account or login to view the content on Vudu, but registration is free.

Sadly, Vudu's playback only works on Chrome (or Chrome based browsers). Firefox will not playback the content from Vudu. As a diehard Firefox user who also happens to absolutely abhor Chrome, this is disappointing. Once in Chrome, however, playback is easy and smooth.

PopcornFlix is yet another free streaming site that has a lot of movies. No login or registration is required. In fact, there is no place on the page to login or register. While they definitely do not have anything that could be remotely considered a "first run" movie, there are some gems in its collection.

Believe it or not, you do not have to have a Roku or be a Roku user to access The Roku Channel. There, you will find a wide variety of TV shows and movies for your streaming pleasure. There is a wide (some might say eclectic) mix of movies and TV shows available to stream for free.

Sony Crackle is, as you might imagine, a streaming site from Sony. You will find a wide assortment of movies and TV shows from Sony's massive library of content, including Crackle-only original programming.

Also, don't overlook YouTube as a source of free movies and TV shows. While I am fully aware of a lot of peoples' desire to avoid anything to do with Google (Google owns YouTube), there are a lot of free movies and TV shows on YouTube. For example, I grew up watching the WWII TV show "Rat Patrol." I can find every Rat Patrol episode on YouTube, commercial/advertisement free. For movies, type "free movies" into the YouTube search bar. There are a LOT of free movies. Many are viewable without any interruptions from advertisements. Others are listed as "Free With Ads," which means exactly what it says. The stream of such content will be periodically interrupted with pointless advertisements. However, the advertisements are short in length. You may have to filter through a lot of chaffe to find the gems, but your efforts will be well rewarded.[a]

There are more free streaming options out there, but these should get you well on your way. You might also want to look at streaming options for your favorite network(s). Recently, for example, we covered the new Comet SciFi TV channel, and how to stream its content in your browser. We also covered how to play IPTV on your PCLinuxOS desktop. Like I stated, there are many more options and choices to tailor your streaming experience to something that suits you and your tastes. For more ideas, check out our article "Cutting The Cord In 2019" in the August 2019 issue of The PCLinuxOS Magazine.



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**Free Documentaries** 

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If documentaries are your idea of entertainment (they are one of my favorites, too), then you are in luck. There are two sites that offer all the documentaries you could ever want. Documentary Heaven is the heavy hitter in this genre, with over 7.420 documentaries hosted on its site. I was even able to find one of my favorite documentaries, "The Fires Of Kuwait," about the Iraqi military's "scorched Earth" policy when they pulled out of Kuwait in the first Gulf War, setting all of the Kuwaiti oil wells on fire and the monumental task of extinguishing those oil well fires. I had only seen it once before, years ago (many years before Dr. Pimple Popper and My 600 Lb Life ever came along), on the TLC cable network when they actually aired informative and educational content.

If you can't find a documentary you're looking for on Documentary Heaven, you might want to try looking on Documentary Storm. You'll find over 870 documentaries hosted there. As far as I can tell, there is no duplication between the two sites. One you might want to take a look at is a documentary from 2011, called "The Space Shuttle," narrated by William "Captain Kirk" Shatner. Or, maybe you're a beer aficionado who would love watching a documentary about craft beers, called "Beer Culture."



Learn Something New ... For Free!



Believe it or not, you can take some free online classes. Many of these free classes are from topnotch universities, such as Harvard, Stanford and MIT. Class Central is one such site, where you can choose which topics you are interested in, and then you can take classes in that topic. Do you want to learn the basics of TCP/IP? Take the "Introduction To TCP/IP? Take the "Introduction To TCP/IP" course from Yonsei University via Coursera. It will require one to two hours of your time per week, over a five week

Khan Academy is a non-profit organization that provides educational content for a wide age range of students. They have content for PreK children, elementary

school aged children, high school students, and early college students. All educational content is delivered, free of charge. This should be a handy site if you need to brush up on your algebra or geometry, want to learn statistics or more about economics or chemistry, or if you want to get a better grip on your personal finances (yes, there's a course for that). It could be especially useful if you have a child, grandchild, niece, nephew, or stepchild that you are frequently asked to assist with homework. There's even a section to help prepare for the SAT or LSAT exams.

There is a section on the website that is geared towards teachers, as well. So, teachers can take the information from Khan Academy and incorporate it into their classrooms and lesson plans. Users will have to register for a free account, though. Of course, all of these lessons and courses are available 100% free of charge for anyone who wants to access them.



If you ever wanted to learn a new language, then **DuoLingo** is the site for you. You choose which language you want to learn ... Spanish, French, German. Italian. Dutch. Portuguese, Japanese, Arabic, Czech, Welsh, Danish, Greek, Finnish. Irish. Hebrew. Hindi, Russian, Korean, Polish, Swedish, or any of many more languages ... including Klingon ... and follow the lessons on the website. You will have to register, but after you do, you will be able to start learning a new language by spending just five minutes per day on your language lessons.



EdX is another site where you can find classes/courses for free. Offering over 3,000 different courses, there are some that you have to pay for and others that are free. The link at the start of this paragraph points to the search for free courses and programs. At the time that this article was being written, there were 62 free programs and 755 free courses available.

We can change that search, and just highlight courses pertaining to Linux. For example, you can take the EdX and Linux Foundation course, "Introduction To Linux," for free. If you want/need a verified certificate for your occupational growth, one is available for \$169 (U.S.) after successful completion of the course. Keep in mind that some Linux courses are fee-based, so not all of them are free. There are 10 programs and 61 courses dedicated to Linux.

Although not a course, TED is another great site where you can learn something new. Founded in 1984, you will find (mostly) relatively short talks covering a wide variety of topics. Here's the "About" definition of TED, straight from the TED website:

"TED is a nonpartisan nonprofit devoted to spreading ideas, usually in the form of short, powerful talks. TED began in 1984 as a conference where Technology, Entertainment and Design converged, and today covers almost all topics — from science to business to global issues — in more than 110 languages. Meanwhile, independently run TEDx events help share ideas in communities around the world."



If you've never watched a talk on TED, you are in for a treat. Some are quite funny, some are quite emotional, others are quite informative, while others are

quite sober. Some are all of those rolled into one. There are talks on TED to cover virtually every and any interest or aspect of life. One our readership may wish to take note of is the 2014 talk by Edward Snowden (given remotely) about how we take back the internet. Currently, you can view TED content without registering or signing in, but the option to register or sign in is available.

#### Free Photo Editing Software



E.V.E.R.Y.O.N.E., it seems, has the ability to shoot LOTS of high quality photos these days, thanks to the widespread proliferation of mobile devices with high resolution digital cameras in them. And, people are shooting LOTS of high quality digital photos. There's going to come a day (if it hasn't already) that you will want to tweak or edit one of those digital photos. When you do, you will need some software to make that possible.

Fortunately, as users of FOSS software, we already have one of the absolute BEST graphics and photo editing software packages on the planet: GIMP. Many of the PCLinuxOS new installations already come with GIMP preinstalled. If it's

not on yours, you can easily install it from Synaptic. GIMP is celebrating its 25th birthday, too!

GIMP rivals the commercial graphics/photo editing software in both quality and ability. In some cases, you might have to change your methods a bit (compared to the commercial software), but the ability is definitely there. If you don't believe me, go look at one of the GIMP forums (there are several ... a quick internet search will point you in the right direction). There are some real masterpieces being produced with GIMP, and many are shared on those forums. Like with just about everything and anything else, there will be a learning curve.

From the GIMP website:

"GIMP is a cross-platform image editor available for GNU/Linux, OS X, Windows and more operating systems. It is free software, you can change its source code and distribute your changes.

Whether you are a graphic designer, photographer, illustrator, or scientist, GIMP provides you with sophisticated tools to get your job done. You can further enhance your productivity with GIMP thanks to many customization options and 3rd party plugins."



PixIr is another free photo/image editor that gives users easy access to a high quality editing platform. But what sets PixIr apart from any other photo/image editor is that it is a web-based application where you do all of your editing in your *web browser*.

PixIr actually has two online photo editors. PixIr X is the "easy to use" photo editor. They also call it "Playful PixIr." PixIr E is the "Powerful" photo editor for "Pros." They also refer to it as "Advanced PixIr." In your browser, they look a lot like GIMP or any other photo editor you've likely used. You will find a lot of the same tools and menus, including filters to apply to your images.



Besides the two online editors, there is a third editor that is dedicated to the removal of backgrounds from images. It is called PixIr BG. When you upload your image, AI (artificial intelligence) attempts to automagically remove the background of your image. This takes only a few seconds. In my case, with the "portrait" of my son's favorite chicken (Optimus), it was close but not exactly what I wanted (it removed too much of Optimus from the right side of the image for what I wanted). So, I hit the "Reset" button and removed the background myself,

using the magic wand tool for the larger areas, and then a brush for the finer detail work of removing the background up close nearest Optimus.

The image in the previous column shows the unaltered, original image on the left, and the image on the right is after removing the background. To be honest, it's the easiest time I've ever had removing a background from a photo. The entire process took me around five minutes, although I probably could have spent a little more time doing the "touchup" work with the brush. Still, the results were impressive, easy to achieve, and good enough for my intended purpose.

Being web-based, PixIr is available to all users, regardless of what platform they are using. There is a special mobile version of PixIr available for use on mobile platforms. Just download the PixIr Mobile app from either the Google Play Store, or from the iOS App Store to your mobile device.

All of these features are available in the free version, but keep in mind that the free version is supported by advertising. PixIr also offers a "premium" package, which is ad free and has some additional benefits for just under \$60 (U.S.) per year (or \$7.99 per month, if you choose to pay monthly). For the really creative person, there is a "Creative Pack" level that provides access to even more features. It costs \$29.99 monthly, or about \$180 for an annual subscription. For comparison purposes, Adobe Photoshop has gone to a cloud-based subscription/support system, which costs around \$10 per month, or \$120 per year for the 20 GiB basic plan. So the PixIr "premium" package comes in at about half the cost of the Adobe Creative Cloud plan.

#### **Free Music**



If music is more your "thing," you're in luck. Although I'm sure you can find music to stream or download from many, many sources, we'll stick with the "standard" fare here. All of the sites listed below require registration and logging in before listening to your favorite

music or programming. None of them, as far as I can tell, allow downloading of music or programming.

Spotify is one of the premiere music streaming sites. There is a free version of it, which is supported by advertising. The free version will allow you to add artists, albums, and individual tracks to your library. Spotify Premium allows users to stream music free of ads, but will set you back \$10 per month, and other plans go

up from there. For that subscription, premium users also get to download music and are awarded unlimited "skips."

Pandora is another popular music streaming site that is advertiser supported. There are a few different paid plans, starting at \$4.99 per month for Pandora Plus, followed by Pandora Premium for \$9.99 per month. There are also family, student and military plans available. The paid plans provide unlimited "skips," adfree personalized radio stations, and access to your favorite podcasts.

Last.fm seems to have lost some of its luster from 10 to 12 years ago, when it seemed to be all the rage. However, it is still around. You can listen to your favorite artists or music genres in the free version. Pay attention to your preferences. You have to choose whether to play your music via a Spotify Premium account, or via YouTube. Initially, nothing would play for me on Last.fm until I changed from the default Spotify Premium setting to YouTube. There is a paid version, called Last.FM Pro, which provides ad-free listening. It will cost you \$30 for an annual subscription, or \$36 a year (\$3.00 per month) if you go with a monthly subscription.

If listening to radio stations from all around the world is more your thing, or if you're living in a place far from your homeland (and would like a taste of your homeland to remedy your homesickness), Shoutcast has you covered. They literally have radio stations from all around the world available for streaming. Over 87,000 radio stations stream over Shoutcast. The streaming was free and easy, but with a caveat. I was unable to consistently playback the streams in Firefox or Chrome. To circumvent that issue, from the left side of the station listing is a play button. Right next to the play button is a download link. Click on the download link, and select the "Any player" option to download a M3U playlist. Then, tell your browser to open the M3U playlist in VLC. It worked perfectly, every single time. Shoutcast is the only exception in this list in that it doesn't require you to log in to listen to a stream.

You can also be your own DJ or program director. On Shoutcast, you can start your own radio station. The prices range from free (Shoutcast Freemium) to Shoutcast Premium to Shoutcast for Business. The first two require you to selfhost your radio stations, while the latter is hosted on Shoutcast servers.

Another good, free radio streaming site is IHeartRadio. Currently, only the countries of the United States and Mexico are showing up as options for me. Select the area that has the radio station(s) you want to hear, and then select your favorite station (provided that your favorite station simulcasts on IHeartRadio).

Finally, don't forget to check out the webpage for your favorite radio station. Most radio stations (at least in the U.S.) have a link on their webpage to allow you to

"listen live" to the current over-the-air broadcast. This will enable you to stream your favorite radio station in an open tab in your browser. The simplicity in this is that you won't have to worry about where to find your favorite radio station's internet stream. It's right there on their website.

#### **Extra Savings**



My apologies to my non-U.S. based readers, but this section is mostly for our U.S. based readers. Please, check in your locale to see if anything like the following is available. It can save you some serious money.

While these are not free, they can save you a serious amount of money. And, of course, the more money you can save on miscellaneous purchases, the more money you have for the "essentials" or even extra "nonessential" expenditures. Plus,

who wants to pay full price for something when you don't have to? Everyone LOVES a bargain.

RetailMeNot is a site that seeks out deals from retailers all across the country, and then lists them on their website. Plus, if there's a special promotional code to get the discount, it collects those, as well. So, before you go to purchase something that isn't on sale and that doesn't have an obvious promotional discount code, it could be beneficial to check out RetailMeNot before you make or complete your purchase. Major U.S. retailers like Bed, Bath & Beyond, Target, Walmart, Lowes, and Old Navy are represented. You will also find discounts on restaurants like Red Lobster, Papa John's, Pizza Hut, Outback SteakHouse, Olive Garden, Panera Bread and many others. There are also discounts on hotel and motel accommodations, as well as auto parts and service, electronics, baby stuff, beauty supplies, pet food and supplies, entertainment, travel, toys, photos, and lots more.

Groupon is another site where users can get significant discounts on a wide multitude of products and services. Just supply your location information and you will find discounts all around the location you've specified. Included are discounts at restaurants, massage therapy services, car repair/service, hotels/motel accommodations, entertainment, sporting events, and many, many more. GoodRx is a site that finds the least expensive price for prescription drugs. It's no secret that prescription drugs in the U.S. are outrageously priced (especially compared to the rest of the planet), so every and any savings is welcomed relief. Until you look for yourself, it's hard to understand just how widely the prices vary for prescription drugs in the U.S. For many Americans, prescription drugs are a significant monthly expense, and GoodRx can help save up to 80 percent on the price of those prescription drugs. Typically, users look up their prescription and print out the coupon for the pharmacy they are going to use. However, users don't have to actually print out the coupon. If users have the mobile app, they can just pull the coupon up on their mobile device and show it to the pharmacist behind the counter, so the pharmacist can enter the proper codes into their system to apply the coupon. In many cases, the GoodRx coupon prices are cheaper than the prices in some health insurance plans (provided they even cover prescription drugs, at all), so it is worth the while to check before filling a prescription.

Finally, if you are a MLU (Mature Linux User), be aware of discounts for seniors. Each company seems to define it a little differently as to who qualifies for a "senior discount," but it certainly doesn't hurt to seek out the information. Some businesses consider anyone over 55 a senior, while others embrace the "senior" benefits at 60, 62 or 65 years of age. Of course, you can join the AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) at the age of 50. That alone will net you many discounts, and the AARP serves as an excellent clearinghouse of information on senior discounts.

#### Summary

I've covered a LOT of freebies and major discounts here in this article. I have no doubts that you will likely find others out there in the wilderness called the internet. But, these that I've listed here should give you plenty of free and low-cost options to chew on for quite a long time.

# Korean Style BBQ Beef Bulgogi

Bulgogi (bul-gow-hee)

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

1 1/2 pounds boneless rib eye steak
 1/4 cup reduced sodium soy sauce
 2 TBSP brown sugar
 3 cloves garlic minced or crushed
 1 TBSP fresh ground ginger
 2 tbsp sesame oil
 1/4 cup apple or pear juice
 2-3 green onions - thinly sliced

Or just buy a bottle of premade Bulgogi sauce at your local Walmart or Trader Joe's store.

Whatever you do DO NOT confuse Bulgogi with Gaegogi (Dog Meat)

#### DIRECTIONS:

Wrap steak in plastic wrap, and place in the freezer for 30 minutes. Unwrap and slice across the grain into 1/4-inch thick slices. (or have your butcher slice it for you)

In a medium bowl, combine apple or pear juice, soy sauce, brown sugar, sesame oil, garlic, and ginger. In a gallon size Ziploc bag, combine soy sauce

mixture and steak; marinate for at least 2 hours to overnight, turning the bag occasionally.

Heat 1 tablespoon vegetable oil in a cast iron grill pan over medium-high heat.\* Working in batches, add steak to the grill pan in a single layer and cook, flipping once, until charred and cooked through, about 2-3 minutes per side. Repeat with remaining 1 tablespoon vegetable oil and steak.

Serve immediately, garnished with green onions and sesame seeds, if desired.

# Inkscape Tutorial: Valentine's Hearts & Background

Valentine's Day is coming up, and sometimes I wish I could make something completely different for a card for a loved one. The cards we get at the store are always beautiful, but sometimes home-made is the best. I saw this tutorial that looked really fun so I thought we could try it. This has a sun-ray sort of background that I wanted to create, so we'll do that first.

Open Inkscape, and start by drawing a long triangle. Duplicate it, flip it, and position the two triangles with their points touching. Group them together.

To create all of the ones we want to create, we'll use **Edit > Clone > Create Tiled Clones**. With the Symmetry setting as Simple Translation, use the settings at right.

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This should make a circular pattern like below. I can see that mine wasn't lined up perfectly, but we'll use it.



Now choose your radial gradient and choose two shades of your desired color to use in the gradient. Apply to the sun-ray pattern. Then, draw a rectangle the same size as your page and add a linear gradient to it. (My Inkscape was acting a bit funny so the shades of blue in my radial gradient look alike.) You should get something like this (next page, top left):

Lock the layer that all these are on, and create a new layer for your hearts and flowers. The hearts and flowers are your design and your decision as to how many you want to do, but let's make a main Valentine's heart.

Using your Bezier tool, you can make "half" of a heart, pulling those nodes (as ms\_meme has said) until you have it the shape you want.



Duplicate it and flip it horizontally, then align the two halves together using Align and Distribute. With them both selected, go to **Path > Combine** and put them together. You also need to choose the nodes at each point (there are two in each place where the halves come together) and click on **Join Selected Nodes**. Change the Stroke to your desired color and use Linear Gradient on the fill.



OK, now duplicate this heart, size it down a bit, change the color a bit and stack them.



My heart above has a bit darker reds and pinks on the bottom than on the top. The border of the bottom heart is dark red, 4 px, and the border on the top heart is grey, 2 px. You may do it differently.

From this heart, you can duplicate, recolor, and add flowers, shadows or whatever. The original tutorial that I read had a couple of flourishes that could be added for decoration as well. Here is one of the flourishes.

I duplicated the heart several times, filled them with different colored gradients and positioned them in my drawing. Using one of the hearts, I went back to **Create Tiled Clones**, set the rows and columns to 1 and 6 (for the sun-ray it was 1 and 12), and set the rotation to 60 rather than 15. This makes a cute flower!



I can add something to the center to make it more colorful.



I imported that flourish, and with it selected, I did **Path > Trace Bitmap**. That will make a tracing of the flourish without the white background (which would be hard to insert into this project!) Choosing the trace, I duplicated it a couple of times, changed it to while, and inserted it into the project in different spots. When I had everything arranged as I desired, I added a Valentine's wish at the bottom.

I'll remind you that when you export this, be sure to export the PAGE. If you export the **drawing**, and you have any extras at the side that you didn't use, they will be included in your export. That's also how you get the sun-ray object squared off even with the page edge. I also put a 1 px border around it, but that is your choice.



We used Create Tiled Clones, Gradients, and Duplicate an awful lot, and even did a Trace Bitmap. I'm sure your creation will be awesome! Have fun!

Commander Montgomery Scott Beamed Up To The ISS ... Sorta



Nearly everyone who has seen Star Trek knows James Doohan, the Canadian-born actor who played Commander Montgomery "Scotty" Scott, the Chief Engineer of the U.S.S. Enterprise. Born in 1920, one of his dying wishes was to have some of his ashes flown into space. James Doohan died in 2005.

The attempts to get Doohan's ashes into space were not necessarily an easy task. In April 2007, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> ounce

(7g) of Doohan's ashes joined 308 others on a memorial flight into space. The flight was a short four minute suborbital flight into space, where the ashes remained onboard, until a planned return by parachute to Earth. Another attempt was made in August 2008, aboard Falcon 1, in what was supposed to be a low earth orbit. However, that rocket failed two minutes into the mission. Then, in 2008, private astronaut Richard Garriott smuggled aboard the ISS (International Space Station) on a laminated card, and it remains hidden under the floor cladding of the ISS's Columbia module.

The presence of Doohan's ashes aboard the ISS remained secret until December 25, 2020, when The Times (London) reported the "event," ending 12 years of secrecy. Previously, only Garriott and Doohan's family had any knowledge of his ashes being aboard the ISS.

In the ensuing 12 years, Doohan's ashes have racked up over 1.7 billion miles in space aboard the ISS, orbiting Earth more than 70,000 times. However, this is not the end of the story.

In 2012, a small urn containing some of Doohan's ashes was flown into space aboard the SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket, as part of the COTS Demo Flight 2.

In the end, Scotty himself was "beamed up" into space ... the final frontier.

**Maskfone Mask/Wireless Headphone.** OK. Give them props. They were at least thinking about how to solve a problem with all of the mask wearing the pandemic has thrust upon us. But there are two huge problems that crop up. First, the price is a bit steep at \$50 (U.S.) for each one. Second, since we should be washing out masks daily, it seems a bit of a hassle to remove all the sensitive and fragile electronics every day before washing the mask fabric.

**Over 10% of people working from home do so naked.** As in, without clothes on. There's no question that the pandemic drastically changed (probably irreversibly) how we work. A LOT more people "worked" from home, by telecomputing. According to a Kaspersky survey, 11% of respondents admitted that they like working sans clothing. Another 36% admit to waking up just five minutes before they have to "be" at work. 23% admit to binge-watching content on Netflix, and 18% admit to playing more video games. Let's just hope that those 11% who like to work naked have their webcams covered!

#### Your Smartwatch Could Help Detect COVID-19 Up To A Week Before You Develop Symptoms

A variety of smartwatches, including those from Apple, FitBit, Garmin and other manufacturers, could help detect persons infected with COVID-19 seven to nine days before they develop symptoms, according to a pair of studies.

One study from Mount Sinai medical center found that measuring heart rate variability (HRV) with an Apple smartwatch, while wearers recorded and tracked any possible symptoms (fever or chills,



tiredness or weakness, body aches, dry cough, sneezing, runny nose, diarrhea, sore throat, headache, shortness of breath, loss of smell or taste, itchy eyes, or none), found significant changes in HRV up to seven days before the patient started showing symptoms. HRV is a metric used to measure immune system health. HRV values change as inflammation develops in the body, and COVID-19 is a disease with high levels of inflammation. Ironically, researchers also discovered that seven to 14 days after the diagnosis of COVID-19, HRV returned to normal and was statistically no different from those who had not been infected.

A second study out of Stanford University (beware: lots of mumbo jumbo technobabble) found that 81% of COVID-19 positive study participants were informed of an irregularity in their HRV up to nine days prior to the onset of symptoms using a variety of smartwatches from multiple sources and special apps to detect and analyze the detected/measured HRV.

The two studies have spurred the development of custom COVID-19 wearables that are 90% effective in early detection of the virus. The wearable, called Empatica E4 and utilizing an AI product called CovidDeep, monitors regular skin, heart rate, and blood pressure readings to make its mostly accurate detection.

Earlier detection could help save lives, detecting COVID-19 infections long before symptoms appear, and long before viral loads skyrocket. A lower viral load could mean easier, more effective, earlier treatment, and thus a lower mortality rate.

#### **Brave First Browser To Support IPFS**



The Chromium-based Brave browser may have just set the browser world on fire with its new support of IPFS. Interplanetary File System works sort of like BitTorrent or other peer-to-peer file sharing sites/programs in that instead of downloading one file from one server, users use IPFS to download chunks of a file from multiple nodes on the IPFS server. This can seriously cut down on the amount of time it takes to download a file.

An article from Lifehacker explained it like this:

Each computer or mobile device—known as "nodes"—temporarily stores a piece of a website's data. So whenever you access a website via IPFS, you're loading the data from other nearby nodes on the network. Users can also access IPFS content via a "public gateway," if they do not wish to act as a local node.

The other advantage that IPFS has is that it decentralizes the web, making it much more difficult for censorship to rear its ugly head. With bits of files downloaded from multiple sources, it makes it infinitely more difficult to block files with content that others want to see limited or eliminated.

Some of the other benefits of using Brave is that they claim to be the fastest web browser around. This is not only, in part, due to its support of IPFS,

but also its superior ad and tracker blocking, along with its built-in ability to also block location reporting. Brave claims to be three times faster than Firefox (the fastest browser of the major browsers) and up to six times faster than Chrome or Safari.

Being based on Chromium, you can download and use your favorite Chrome plug-ins and add-ons freely. The Brave browser is available for installation from the PCLinuxOS repository.

Don't get the idea that using IPFS will mask what you are downloading. Your ISP can still track what you are downloading, just as they do with the downloading of files from a single URL. To do that, you will need end-to-end encryption, as is often offered with the use of a VPN. But, because of the multi-nodal nature of IPFS, it becomes a lot more difficult to block access to the content you wish to obtain. The aforementioned Lifehacker article does an excellent job explaining IPFS.

#### How Do Animals See The World?

The HomeAdvisor website ran a very interesting article recently, called "How Pets See Your Home." It compared what a human sees to how your pet (or other animal) sees the world. They were able to figure out how each animal sees, by comparing eye structure, the number of rods and cones, eye placement, and a few other variables.

Dogs live in a pastel world of shades of blue and yellow (and combinations of them). They possess only 20% to 40% of their human counterpart's visual acuity, but compensate with a 240 degree field of view.

Cats color perception is somewhere between that of a dog's on the low end, and humans on the upper end of the scale. Their field of vision is approximately 200 degrees. But where cats really excel is in their low light vision.



Parrots, like most birds, have a highly developed sense of vision. They can see UV (humans can't), blue, green and yellow. They can also see approximately 300 degrees, have monocular vision (one eye can view something, while the other wanders around), can adjust their focus very quickly, and have voluntary control of their pupils.

Spiders have rather weak eyesight, despite having around eight eyes. Their eyes don't contain cones (the color sensing part of the eye), instead relying on proteins called ospins, which might be sensitive to certain colors, which may help them with mating. Spiders rely more on the little hairs all over their legs to feel their way around, more so than vision.

Goldfish can see more colors than humans, with their eyesight extending into the UV range. This should help the goldfish see with more clarity underwater, as well as help the goldfish see where Fido has marked your sofa as part of his territory. Their eyes can see almost 360 degrees (ever wonder where we get the term fisheye lens?), and their eye density is nearly the same as water, which may help compensate for the bending of light in water.

**FSearch** is a very fast standalone file search utility inspired by the Windows-only Everything search engine. FSearch indexes file directories and builds a database, allowing you to get almost instant search results as you type. This makes FSearch extremely fast when compared to many other search tools built into file managers.

The interface is fairly simple and well designed, making FSearch quick and easy to use. The search results will appear as a list below the search bar. Down at the bottom of the screen are indicators showing how many files have been found, and how many files have actually been indexed.

Before you can start searching for files, you have to add some directories to the database. Go to the preferences, accessible from the Edit menu, and head to the Database tab. From here, you can now add the directories that you want to be able to search in, such as your home folder. You can also choose folders that you want to be excluded from the search database, and you can even exclude certain file formats. FSearch can be set to automatically update the database each time the program starts, so you can be sure that all recent files get indexed. To manually update the database, press Shift-Ctrl-R. Depending on the size of the folder, however, it may take quite a while for everything to be indexed.



As soon as you've added some folders to the search database, FSearch will be ready for use. Once you start searching for something, the results will appear almost instantaneously. You can set it to search for files only, or folders only, or both. The search results can be sorted by name, file path, type, size, and date modified. You can also open or delete any file listed in the search results, or open the folder that the file is located in. FSearch also has RegEx support, for more precise file searching.

#### Summary

All in all, I found FSearch to work very well in my testing, although one of it's biggest drawbacks is that it can take quite some time to update the file database. After that though, it's very fast when you actually need to find something. If you're looking for an easy to use, PCLinuxOS alternative to the Everything search tool, I believe FSearch is a good choice.

# Sharing A USB Drive From Your Wi-Fi Router

#### by David Pardue (kalwisti)

#### Background

Many modern routers have a built-in USB port which allows you to easily share an attached drive with all of the computers on your home network – wired or via Wi-Fi. I attempted to set this up with our Wi-Fi router (a TP-Link AC4000) and an old Seagate Barracuda HD (80 GB) that was already in a 3.5" external drive enclosure. You may use any type of drive with a USB connection – external HDD or SSD, portable HD or even a high-capacity flash drive.



*Caveat:* Although my experiment succeeded, I am not a network guru by any stretch of the imagination, so the procedure outlined here might not be the most efficient or technically correct. However, you might find this write-up helpful if you are trying to accomplish this for the first time. I hope it will save you some time and effort.

You should have realistic expectations about the performance of this "home cloud." A router's primary function is to host your network, so it will not be as

capable as a dedicated NAS (Network-Attached Storage) server – such as those made by Synology, QNAP, or Western Digital – costing hundreds of dollars. Nevertheless, if you only want some casual network storage larger than the limits imposed by free services such as Dropbox, Box, Google Drive or even PCLOS-Cloud<sup>1</sup>, the approach outlined here is an inexpensive way to get more use out of your Wi-Fi router. Another advantage of this approach is that data transmission occurs only within your local network; no traffic is sent out to the internet unless you tell it to do so.

#### **Preparing the Hard Drive**

The TP-Link AC4000 has a USB port which can share resources on a USB device via FTP and Samba. It supports the NTFS, FAT32, exFat and HFS+ file systems; no native Linux file systems are supported, unfortunately.

I opted to use NTFS, so my first step was to format the Seagate HD using GParted. I created a single large partition for data storage with ntfs as its file system.

Next, plug your drive into the router's USB port and power it up.

#### **Enable USB Drive Sharing**

You will need administrative access to your router in order to activate USB drive sharing; this feature might also be referred to as Drive storage, File sharing or something similar. From any computer on your network, open a browser and navigate to your router's IP address. You can often find this information on the back of the router, printed on a reference card that came packed in the original box, in the device's manual, or online (the manufacturer's website). In most cases, the IP address will look like 192.168.X.X.

This particular TP-Link Wi-Fi router is managed/accessed from the address http://tplinkwifi.net. (The address http://192.168.0.1 also works). When the page loads, you must log in with your username and password. If you have never changed your router's default credentials, there is a good chance that the username is admin, and the password is admin – as this convention is used by several manufacturers (TP-Link, Netgear, Linksys, etc.).

### Sharing A USB Drive From Your Wi-Fi Router

After logging in, the configuration section for USB sharing is shown below. The router's management software auto-assigned the name volume1 (G:) to the Seagate Barracuda HD:



The software assigns the default name TP-Share to the external HD (although you may change its name if desired). You can also see the server's SMB and FTP addresses.



Although sharing the drive can be customized – by specifying that only certain folders on the HD may be shared – I chose to allow sharing the entire disk's content.

The router allows you to set up authentication for your USB device, so that network clients will be required to enter a username and password when accessing the USB disk. However, after some discussion, we decided to turn off authentication and allow anonymous connections. Only three of us will be using this network storage, and we are all suffering from password fatigue.



The web-based management page of my AC4000 looks like this:

#### Access Drive/Create a Network Share (in Windows)

If you have a Windows PC in your network, you probably want to make the USB disk accessible to Windows and map it as a Network Drive (if you plan on leaving it attached). We configured this from my son's desktop machine, since he uses Windows 10 for all his college coursework.

#### **Package Check**

To make sure that everything works correctly, check whether the packages below are installed on your system. (In my case, they were already present).

- ntfs-3g
- ntfs-config
- samba-common
- cifs-utils

Although Samba is more feature-rich, in this article I will focus on FTP because it is more straightforward to set up. FTP is OS-agnostic; it works regardless of

which OS you prefer. The protocol was developed in the 1970s by Abhay Bhushan while he was a graduate student at M.I.T. (Mr. Bhushan is also credited with authoring early versions of e-mail protocols).

I will discuss four PCLinuxOS DE's in order of my familiarity with them. I have primarily been using the MATE desktop since around 2016; prior to that, I ran Xfce for several years. My first contact with Linux involved KDE 3.5, so exploring Trinity is a fun blast from the past. Although I used KDE 4, I have been away from KDE long enough that Plasma 5 makes me feel somewhat lost at sea.

#### MATE DE

#### **FTP With FileZilla**

FileZilla is the most well-known and popular FTP client today. It supports all the major operating systems – Linux, Windows, macOS – and has built-in security features. The program's interface is fairly intuitive; however, I included a few tips below in case it has been a while since you have used FileZilla.

FileZilla's default protocol is FTP, so you do not need to type "ftp:// " prior to the server's IP address (Host). The default port for FTP is 21, so you may omit it, if you wish. In the screenshot below, I included them out of habit.

Since I disabled access authentication for the USB disk, FileZilla gives an "Insecure FTP connection" warning message when I try to connect to the server.

To dismiss the notification dialog, you can select "Always allow insecure plain FTP for this server."

Caja has a split window option, which makes it easy to transfer files between locations. Caja developers call this feature an "Extra Pane." Activate this from the View menu > Extra Pane, or press the F3 function key.

Below is a screenshot of Caja with its Extra Pane activated.



Based on my testing, I found Caja's behavior with FTP a bit flaky – with unpredictable crashes. This surprised me, because it is typically a rock-solid file manager. I would recommend FileZilla for dependable FTP use within MATE.

#### Xfce DE

The FileZilla method works identically to what is described in the MATE section above.

#### Via FTP (using Gigolo, with help from Thunar [1.8.15])

Gigolo is a frontend tool to easily manage connections to local and remote filesystems. The application's developer, Enrico Tröger<sup>2</sup>, playfully named it Gigolo because ... (a drumroll, please) ... "It mounts what it is told to." Based on my experience, Gigolo works well.

#### Open Gigolo:



From the Actions menu > choose Connect. A "Connect to Server" dialog window opens. Fill in the information as indicated below:

Then, press the Connect button (next column, top left).

streamlined system, so that option is omitted. Nevertheless, it is possible to have two tabs open simultaneously in Thunar (by typing Ctrl+T, or activating it under the File menu > New Tab).

With two tabs side by side, it is not too burdensome to copy files between the chosen locations.

Currey, who had been homeless on and off over the years, admitted that he thought about using the cards at first, but he ultimately decided to call Topper and give back her wallet. "Anybody in the position of being homeless and cold and tired and hungry, if they found a credit card, they're going to think about it," Currey, 57, told the Post. "But whether you're going to act on it is two different things. I would rather be cold and hungry and know that I did the right thing," he added.

Mrs. Topper had lost her wallet the day before, and did not realize her wallet was missing until she got home. When it was returned to her, her 12 year-old granddaughter, Mikayla Gounard, wanted to find a way to give back. Her mother started a GoFundMe page on her behalf to raise money for Currey and others in his situation. As of the original article's writing, the page had raised more than \$42,000. As of this writing, it has raised over \$54,000.

Their goal was to raise enough money to get Currey off the streets and into temporary housing so he could stay "safe and warm."

### **Man Restores Cars For Neighbors**

A man in North Carolina is busy refurbishing old cars for neighbors who have no mode of transportation. Once it is ready to hit the road, a car will go to the Sharing House Wheels to Work program, whose mission is to empower individuals by giving them reliable transportation.

It might not be the most popular web browser out there. Its popularity peaked in 2009 with a little over 32 percent of the browser "market." Today, depending on who is reporting the data, Firefox enjoys between three and nine percent of the browser market share. But, it has persevered and it is responsible for helping to shape many of the web standards we enjoy today. Plus, it certainly pre-dates most of its competition.

Having started "life" as Netscape's open source browser, born out of Netscape's Mozilla community after AOL (remember them?) bought Netscape, Firefox has been with us for quite a long time. In fact, it has been around since 2002. In full disclosure, I have been a Firefox user since its inception. For me, Firefox is **THE** standard to which I hold all other web browsers.



Why do I like it so much? There are several reasons, with transparency being at or near the top of the list. The rest of that list (in no particular order) includes security, extensibility with add-ons, speed, ease of use, embracing of actual standards, privacy protection, and the list goes on. Plus, when you've used something THAT LONG, you get used to how things are done. It feels comfortable and right. It would be virtually impossible to list every single tip or trick with Firefox. There are probably as many tips and tricks as there are users, thanks to its ability to be customized for each individual user. But, let's cover a few tips and tricks that might be helpful or useful to the average user.

### **Firefox Task Manager**

Have you ever been cruising along and all of a sudden, things slow to a crawl. While you might be tempted to close Firefox and start afresh, there might be another way. Sometimes, the result of a slowdown might not be caused by what you think it is. Fortunately, Firefox has a built-in Task Manager to help you figure out what (or who) is causing the slowdown.

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First, click on the three-line "hamburger nenu" in Firefox, located in the upper ight corner of the Firefox window.

Scroll down to the "More" entry, select it, and you should see additional menu entries, as shown above. Select "Task Manager" from the "More" menu.

Then, you should see a screen that resembles the image at the top left of the next page. Listed is every open tab you have open in Firefox and every extension and add-on you have installed in Firefox. The Task Manager will also display a column listing what each entry is (Tab or Add-on), it's "Energy Impact"

(which is important if you are running Firefox on a device powered by batteries), and how much memory each item is using.

As you mouse over each item in the list, you should see each line highlighted. If you find an item that's consuming more energy or memory than it should, you can eliminate/stop that (those) item(s) by clicking the "X" at the far right edge of each line entry.

Sometimes, add-ons will be updated in the background, but the updated add-on will malfunction, causing a slowdown. Other times, a runaway script on a page you're visiting will cause Firefox to become sluggish. Whatever the case, the Firefox Task Manager should make it abundantly clear what is making your browsing session move slower than molasses on a bitter cold January night.

## Do You Want To Play A Game?

Hidden deep in the source code for Firefox is a hidden gem. Many people call these "Easter Eggs," which are secret little "treats" for users to discover, but only if they hold their mouth just right, spin around on one foot, and catch a fairy in their right hand ... all at the same time.

To be honest, I'm not sure what the "official" name of this Easter Egg is, but I call it Unicorn Pong. Here's how you access it.





**Step 1:** Go to the Firefox "hamburger" menu (upper right corner) and select "Customize" from the menu. You should see a screen that resembles the screenshot above.

**Step 2:** See all of the "tools" on the left side of the screen in the first image? Click and drag them ... ALL of them ... to the "Overflow Menu." Your Overflow Menu should look something like the image above. The only tool that cannot be "moved" to the Overflow Menu is the one marked "Flexible Space."

**Step 3:** You will/should notice a new, discreet little button has been added to the "Customize" screen. It is a little unicorn with a rainbow horn and tail. I've "marked" it with an arrow in the above image.



**Step 4:** Click the "Unicorn" button. You should see something like the image above, but on the left side of your "Customize" screen. Your "paddle" is at the top of the play area. Move your paddle with either your mouse or the left/right cursor keys on your keyboard, attempting to intercept the unicorn and send him/her back down to the paddle at the bottom of the screen. It is, actually, a one-player version of pong.

The image above shows the entire "Customize" screen in Firefox, after I've moved the tools to the Overflow Menu, and as I've started a game of Unicorn Pong.

To put things "back to normal," just click the unicorn button again to stop play (or wait until all of your unicorn lives have been used up), then drag the tools back over to the tool area from the Overflow Menu. Or, you could just hit the "Restore Defaults" button at the lower right of the screen, and then the "Done" button.

The hidden little game is a fun distraction to keep in mind when you're mindlessly waiting for an appointment, a late colleague, or waiting on someone else to finish up whatever tasks they have going on.

## Hello, Humans! We Visit In Peace!

Type **about:robots** into Firefox's address bar and a "Welcome Humans!" message will show up. The message is from robots who "have shiny metal posteriors which should not be bitten." It's a reference to Futurama's Bender, the robot whose trademark catchphrase is "Bite my shiny metal @\$\$."

The tab is titled "**Gort! Klaatu barada nikto**," in an obvious reference to one of the most iconic phrases in science fiction, from the 1951 SciFi film "The Day The Earth Stood Still." The phrase also found its way into the 2008 remake of the film, starring Keanu Reeves.

These are fun, even if apocalyptic and cryptic in nature, "verses" from the mythical Book of Mozilla that is embedded in the Firefox code. The verses have appeared since 1998, when Netscape first open-sourced its browser code. The "verse" changes periodically.

The current "verse" (shown above) is the current one that was inserted starting with the Firefox 80 Nightly builds. You can access them easily enough, simply by typing "**about:mozilla**" in the Firefox address bar.

If you want to see all of the Book of Mozilla verses that have appeared since they began (there have been seven verses released), along with a brief history of them, I recommend that you check this out. This link also contains verses that appear in browsers that are derived from Firefox. Or, if you just want to read the verses (Netscape/Mozilla/Firefox only) without any historical (or other) context, you can see them all here.
